The Authority is authorized to enter into agreements with the State Corporation Commission and Departments of Medical Assistance Services, Health, and Social Services regarding the performance of duties related to the conduct of the Exchange. The Exchange shall be funded by assessments on health insurers offering plans in the Exchange. Persons who file information that is known to be false or misleading, or willfully and knowingly violate any provision of the Act, are subject to a civil penalty of not more than \$5,000. The same market rules shall apply to health plans sold inside and outside the Exchange. Mandated health benefits applicable to plans offered outside the Exchange shall also apply to plans offered through the Exchange. Insurance companies shall offer the same health plans, for the same price, inside and outside the Exchange.
