Understanding with the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS), signing of a three-way contract with CMS and participating plans, and approval of the necessary amendments to the State Plan for Medical Assistance and any waivers thereof; (ii) enhanced program integrity and fraud prevention efforts to include at a minimum: recovery audit contracting (RAC), data mining, service authorization, enhanced coordination with the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit (MFCU), and Payment Error Rate Measurement (PERM); (iii) inclusion of children enrolled in foster care in managed care; (iv) implementation of a new eligibility and enrollment information system for Medicaid and other social services; (v) improved access to Veterans services through creation of the Veterans Benefit Enhancement Program; and (vi) expedite the tightening of standards, services limits, provider qualifications, and licensure requirements for community behavioral health services.

3. In the second phase of reform, the Department of Medical Assistance Services shall implement value-based purchasing reforms for all recipients subject to a Modified Adjusted Gross Income (MAGI) methodology for program eligibility and any other recipient categories not excluded from the Medallion II managed care program. Such reforms shall, at a minimum, include the following: (i) the services and benefits provided are the types of services and benefits provided by commercial insurers and may include appropriate and reasonable limits on services such as occupational, physical, and speech therapy, and home care with the exception of non-traditional behavioral health and substance use disorder services; (ii) reasonable limitations on non-essential benefits such as non-emergency transportation are implemented; and (iii) patient responsibility is required including reasonable cost-sharing and active patient participation in health and wellness activities to improve health and control costs.

To administer this reformed delivery model, the department is authorized to contract with qualified health plans to offer recipients a Medicaid benefit package adhering to these principles. Any coordination of non-traditional behavioral health services covered under contract with qualified health plans or through other means shall adhere to the principles outlined in paragraph OO. c. This reformed service delivery model shall be mandatory, to the extent allowed under the relevant authority granted by the federal government and shall, at a minimum, include (i) limited high-performing provider networks and medical/health homes; (ii) financial incentives for high quality outcomes and alternative payment methods; (iii) improvements to encounter data submission, reporting, and oversight; (iv) standardization of administrative and other processes for providers; and (v) support of the health information exchange.

The second phase of reform shall also include administrative simplification of the Medicaid program through any necessary waiver(s) and/or State Plan authorization under Titles XIX and XXI of the Social Security Act and outline agreed upon parameters and metrics to provide maximum flexibility and expedited ability to develop and implement pilot programs to test innovative models that (i) leverage innovations and variations in regional delivery systems; (ii) link payment and reimbursement to quality and cost containment outcomes; or (iii) encourage innovations that improve service quality and yield cost savings to the

This includes funding for district administration and technical staff to address on-going technical assistance requests such as those for dam safety, stream bank stabilization, soil inventories, ponds, assistance to non-agricultural property owners, resource management plans, the conservation reserve enhancement program, engineering of livestock exclusion practices, the Agricultural Tax Credit Program, increasing need for public education and assistance, and to meet identified needs for district operations. As part of operations, it is also notable that district business infrastructure support for rent, salaries, vehicles, travel and training has not kept pace with needs.

Budget templates prepared by the 47 Soil and Water Conservation Districts in June 2015 showed an increased need of approximately \$1.63 million to meet the essential operations of the districts in fiscal year 2017 and \$1.89 million in fiscal year 2018. The Budget Template was initially developed in 2012 by a stakeholder advisory group that was tasked to examine funding needs for administration and operation of the districts as requested by the General Assembly. For three years Virginia's 47 SWCDs have completed these templates in order to better determine the state costs associated with operating the districts.

Soil and Water Conservation Districts are the essential player at the local level to implement nonpoint source programs to accomplish water goals established by the General Assembly. To meet the requirements of the Chesapeake Bay and Southern Rivers Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDL), districts must have adequate resources to educate, plan, design, and implement nonpoint source pollution control programs. Districts have proven to be the most cost effective means of accomplishing these water quality goals.

Without adequate funding, conservation districts continue to find it especially difficult to meet the critical needs to retain highly trainer, experienced and skilled employees who are the primary delivery mechanism for programs to meet the Commonwealth's water quality goals established by the Governor and the General Assembly.)

Revenue from overnight facilities account for \$9 million of total park revenues. In 2015, state parks contributed to a statewide economic impact of over \$208 million. At the same time, the agency has lost \$2.2 million in general funds since fiscal year 2008 and much of the remaining general funds have been redeployed to unavoidable cost increases such as employee benefits and inflationary operating costs while demand for park services has grown by 24%. The agency has managed this situation by deferring the hiring of up to 54 allocated salaried employees, creating a 22% field vacancy rate while only partially addressing park operating needs, equipment replacement, natural resource projects and maintenance backlogs.

The proposed positions include 20 Chief Ranger Visitor Experience, 11 Park Rangers for maintenance, 10 housekeeping manager positions and two park office managers.

In total, the requested \$5.3 million is the equivalent cost of recovering the salary of 54 park employees plus the salary and benefits for 43 new positions.)

These variables are important to measure a locality's traffic enforcement program. Lastly, Governor McAuliffe's Task Force for Local Government Mandate Review also recommends ending the mandatory deposit of local revenues. At least 33 cities and counties are affected by the budget language.
