Chapter 824 and 829 of the Acts of Assembly of 2008 except that (i) any effective dates contained in Chapter 824 and 829 of the Acts of Assembly of 2008 are superseded by the provisions of this item; (ii) delegation of procurement authority to the VCCS shall be to the State Board for Community Colleges; (iii) the State Board for Community Colleges shall be responsible for approving any subsequent delegation of procurement authority to its Shared Services Center staff based on qualifications and performance of the Shared Services Center staff; (iv) the institution's chief procurement officer and lead buyer must have and maintain the Virginia Contracting Officer (VCO) certification, Certified University Purchasing Officer (CUPO), or equivalent professional certifications, and other team lead buyers must achieve equivalent certification within two years of Level II authority being approved or within two years of hiring unless exempted by the Department of General Services; (v) the institution by the Department of General Services in order to be eligible for the additional procurement authority."
