Medicaid adopted the same groupings to determine eligibility for certain Medicaid categories, such as the medically needy program (spenddown) and for lowincome parents. Over time, the Groupings have been revised differently in both programs, and currently there are major inconsistencies that lack any justification and create major inequities and complexities in application processing and eligibility for benefits. For example, the following counties are in the lowest Grouping for Medicaid, but the highest Grouping for TANF: Caroline County, Fauquier County, James City County, King George County, Spotsylvania County, Stafford County and York County. The inequities are significant. For example, to meet a 6-month spenddown, an elderly person in these counties would need to incur \$979 more in medical expenses before qualifying for Medicaid than a similarly situated person in the highest Group.
