## REPORT OF THE SUBCOMMITTEE on TRANSPORTATION

Mr. Chairmen and Members of the Committee:

The Transportation Subcommittee is pleased to recommend in budget what the House endorsed in legislation last week. The subcommittee report for the 2000-02 budget includes over \$493 million in general and nongeneral funds for the Priority Transportation Fund and provides up to \$800 million in proceeds from federal grant anticipation notes. In all, the subcommittee recommends a total of nearly \$1.3 billion in 2000-02 for high-priority road, transit, and other transportation projects.

In addition, our report endorses the projects separately identified by the Governor in the introduced budget and directs that they be funded out of increased transportation funds in the next biennium. These include the Airports Revolving Loan Fund, the telework tax credit, the Smithsonian Air and Space Museum Annex, support for our ports, and debt service on bonds for the Eastern Shore Railroad.

In other action, the subcommittee recommends that the Commonwealth Transportation Board allocate at least six percent of eligible federal Surface Transportation Program funds and 18 percent of federal Minimum Guarantee funds for transit projects. Combined with the significant funding for transit capital projects in the new Priority Transportation Fund, these budget amendments provide tremendous opportunities for public transportation across the Commonwealth.

Finally, the subcommittee is pleased to recommend a budget amendment for the Specialized Transportation Council. The council, which is chaired by the Lieutenant Governor, supports the development of safe, cost-effective, coordinated, and specialized transportation services for elderly or disabled Virginians.

The details of the Subcommittee's report are contained in the attachments. Committee staff will review the report and the attached listing of our recommendations at this time, and we hope it will be your pleasure to adopt the report.
