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REPORT OF THE SUBCOMMITTEE on NATURAL RESOURCES

Mr. Chairmen and Members of the Committee:

As we begin to face increased budgetary pressures, it is evermore important that we strive to protect the vital natural resources of our Commonwealth, an area that continues to receive only one percent of our state budget.

We propose restoring funds for the preservation of lands for fish and wildlife habitat, natural areas, agriculture, forests and open space. This must continue to be a priority as we seek a balance between growth and conservation. We also recommend restoring funding to our great park system and our natural area preserves, where quality recreational opportunities are afforded our citizens; at the same time, we promote tourism while preserving our native plant and animal species.

Our second area of interest is protection of our valuable water resources. The Water Quality Improvement Act, passed by the General Assembly in 1997, continues to provide new funding for water quality programs. In just four years, this legislation has brought about unprecedented efforts to control point and nonpoint source pollution of the lakes, rivers, streams and bays of our great Commonwealth.

The Natural Resources Subcommittee wants to ensure the Water Quality Improvement Fund remains viable for its intended purpose. In that regard, we offer amendments to restore water quality funds while also providing appropriate funding for Combined Sewer Overflow projects, which seek to prevent the dumping of raw sewage into our rivers. Along with interest earnings from the Water Quality Improvement Fund, our amendments provide over \$6.0 million for water quality initiatives in the second year.

Finally, we recommend the restoration of funding to your local Soil and Water Conservation Districts, which provide a vital link in coordinating our efforts, literally at the grass roots.

We hope you will agree that the amendments, which follow go a long way toward restoring funding for our natural resources. I will ask staff to take you through the detailed amendments to House Bill 1600.

Following the staff explanation of our amendments, we hope it will be the pleasure of the Committee to adopt our recommendations.
