## REPORT OF THE SUBCOMMITTEE ON ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND NATURAL RESOURCES

Mr. Chairmen and Members of the Committee:

I am pleased to report the recommendations of the Economic Development and Natural Resources Subcommittee. Our deliberations in putting together these recommendations were marked by serious concerns for our environment and in ensuring that Virginia maintains its well-deserved record of achievement in economic development. The issues confronting us are complex.

The introduced budget bill cuts services by almost \$40.0 million in economic development and natural resources, including:

- \$20.2 million targeted to specific activities;
- \$11.0 million spread across-the-board and unspecified; and
- \$8.6 million in productivity savings.

This subcommittee, like all the others in Finance, recognizes the necessity of controlling both spending and taxes. We know that this is the challenge of governing. But, how do we craft a budget that responds to high levels of expectation to continue tax relief and to provide essential services?

Our solution was to go back to the basics. Government must honor its legal commitments. Period. And so, we reordered the priorities of this budget. Our recommendations are not a call for new spending nor for mortgaging our children's future. Our recommendations contain over \$14.0 million of budget cuts and savings. Our recommendations are a call to focus limited resources on legal and constitutional commitments Virginia has made to and on behalf of her citizens.

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## SELECTED SERVICES REDUCED IN THE PROPOSED BUDGET

1. <u>Virginia Land Conservation Foundation</u> is an essential program to help meet the state's commitment to the Chesapeake Bay Agreements and to preserve open space. The Foundation protects environmentally sensitive lands from development.

Subcommittee: Restore full amount of \$6.2 million.

2. <u>Water Quality Improvement Act</u> restores and improves water quality. As a result, we have prevented 665,378 tons of soil, 3.6 million pounds of nitrogen, and 700,000 pounds of phosphorus from running off from farmlands into state waters. We have partnered with 15 local wastewater treatment plants to install state-of-the-art biological nutrient removal technologies.

Subcommittee Action: Add \$8.2 million to work with the agriculture industry and local governments.

3. <u>Virginia's State Parks</u> hosted a record 6 million visitors last year at its 34 statewide facilities.

Subcommittee: Add \$1.5 million deemed essential to keep parks open, safe, and accessible to the public.

4. <u>Soil and Water Conservation Districts</u> were created by the state to conserve and protect soil and water resources. The districts are made up of locally elected people who volunteer their time and energy to work with farmers and landowners. They are the state's frontline team for improving water quality.

Subcommittee: Restore full amount of \$1.75 million.

5. Agriculture and Consumer Services markets and promotes Virginia-grown products; inspects food processors; diagnoses animal diseases and tests for food safety; regulates weights and measures, motor fuels, and fertilizers; and protects consumers. The proposed budget cuts almost 10 percent of the agency's second year funding, which, in our view places these essential services in jeopardy.

Subcommittee: Restore \$1.7 million for priority services.

## Conclusion

Our recommendations do not restore all of the Governor's proposed reductions. The productivity savings will remain. Indeed, we could have justified investing more in economic development and to have cut less, if the economic future was more certain. However, with future revenues likely to tumble, state agencies will have to learn to do even more with fewer resources. But we are of the opinion that the Governor still has flexibility in the budget to respond to new economic opportunities. Our priorities are to restore essential services, and these recommendations before you will best serve the Commonwealth and her citizens.
