

Report of the Subcommittee on Capital Outlay/Special Projects

(Amendments to SB 750, as Introduced

Senate Finance Committee Virginia General Assembly

February 4, 2007

Mr. Chairman:

Once again our report on capital outlay is dominated by cost overruns.

The budget as introduced contained over \$132 million GF in additional funding for existing capital projects. To this we are reluctantly recommending another \$11.8 million in requests that came to us directly from state agencies and institutions. This brings our four year total for project supplements to over \$550 million GF. Let me give you just two examples. One project – just approved in 2006 with an appropriation of \$26.4 million GF — is in the introduced budget for an increase of \$14.0 million GF. <u>This is a 53 percent increase in one year!</u> Another project is asking for an increase of \$22.6 million GF, and they admit that they don't even have a contractor who will guarantee to build this project for the now modest price of over \$71 million.

Your subcommittee would not recommend the supplement for this last project – in fact, we almost did not – if it had not been included in the 2002 General Obligation Bond package approved by the voters, AND if it did not have a significant local contribution already in hand. These cost overruns must end! Our recommendations include changes in the capital planning and budgeting processes that will result in greater reliability, better quality, and increased responsibility for all concerned.

Taken together, and combined with prudence and discipline, the Subcommittee believes these initiatives can bring back much needed structure and accountability to the Commonwealth's capital process.


Other than project supplements, our recommendations are very modest. Everyone must keep in mind, however, that the General Assembly provided over \$1.0 billion GF for capital projects less than twelve months ago. Now is not the time to bite off more. Our agencies and institutions, and the commercial contractors who do the work, must be allowed time to work through the projects already authorized. To put too many projects out in an already saturated market could be just as irresponsible as authorizing too few.

We are aware that many of you are interested in specific capital projects. With that in mind, a detailed spreadsheet is attached.

Mr. Chairman, we believe that our recommended amendments set out a sound approach for the Commonwealth's capital program. It is our hope it will be your pleasure to adopt them.



Page 539, following line 38, insert:

"George Mason University (GMU) is hereby granted authority to impose restrictive covenants on its property as required by the federal grant supporting this project, by executing and recording a Notice of Federal Interest."

Explanation:

(This amendment provides language authorizing George Mason University to place a restrictive covenant on the new Biocontainment Laboratory. The \$25.0 million federal grant received for the project requires the university to record a Notice of Federal Interest in the Prince William County land records. The Assistant Attorney General advised that the university required explicit authority to do so.)

Page 550, following line 25, insert: "C-86.40. Alternative Financing Authority

Fund Sources:

- 1. Subject to the provisions of this act, the General Assembly authorizes the University of Mary Washington to enter into a written agreement or agreements with the University of Mary Washington Real Estate Foundation (UMWREF) to support student housing projects and/or operational related facilities through alternative financing agreements including public-private partnerships.
- 2. The University of Mary Washington is further authorized to enter into written agreements with UMWREF to support such student housing facilities; the support may include agreements to (i) include the student housing facilities in the University's student housing inventory; (ii) manage the operation and maintenance of the facilities, including collection of rental fees as if those students occupied University-owned housing; (iii) assign students to the facilities in preference to other University-owned facilities; (iv) seek to obtain police power over the student housing as provided by law; and (v) otherwise support the student housing facilities consistent with law, provided that the University shall not be required to take any action that would constitute a breach of the University's obligations under any document or other instruments constituting or securing bonds or other indebtedness of the University or the Commonwealth of Virginia.
- 3. The General Assembly further authorizes the University of Mary Washington to enter into a written agreement with a public or private entity to design, construct, and finance a facility or facilities to provide additional student housing and/or operational related facilities. The facility or facilities may or may not be located on property owned by the Commonwealth. The University of Mary Washington is also authorized to enter into a written agreement with the public or private entity to lease all or a portion of the facilities. The State Treasury is authorized to make Treasury loans to provide interim financing for planning, construction and other costs of any of the projects. Revenue bonds issued by or for UMWREF will provide construction and/or permanent financing.

4. The University of Mary Washington is further authorized to convey parcels of land to the UMWREF, which will develop the land for the purpose of establishing residential housing for students and/or faculty and staff, office, retail, and other commercial land uses in accordance with the University's approved Master Plan."

(This amendment provides alternative financing authority for the University of Mary Washington.)

Page 552, following line 20, insert:

"Norfolk State is authorized to enter into a long-term lease or other written agreements, with Norfolk State University Foundation (NSUF) or the Enterprise and Empowerment Foundation (E2F) for the development, design, construction and financing of a multilevel parking garage to be located on the University's campus in the City of Norfolk. The development of this additional parking is in accordance with the University's approved Master Plan. NSUF or E2F will develop this parking structure as part of the necessary infrastructure of the University in support of planned public safety as well as existing and planned student housing."

Explanation:

(This amendment provides authority for Norfolk State University to enter into a lease for a parking garage.)
