# 2010 REPORT OF THE EDUCATION SUBCOMMITTEE CHARLES J. COLGAN, CHAIRMAN

#### Members of the Committee:

I am pleased to present to you the Education Subcommittee's budget recommendations.

In these challenging times, our members have wrestled with difficult decisions personally and politically. Through the work of all the Subcommittees, we have strived to set our budget apart as a way to protect education in Virginia from further deep reductions and job losses.

#### **Public Education**

In addition to crunching the numbers, the Subcommittee had a useful dialogue with local governments, school boards, administrators, teachers, and parents about the reality of what additional state reductions would mean in the schools, and about how to allow needed flexibility without sacrificing important programs our students need -- now more than ever.

The hard work of all the Subcommittees helped us limit additional reductions to K-12, prioritizing the preservation of quality education and saving thousands of jobs across the state. We are recommending additional net reductions of just \$37 million in FY 2011. In fact, the restoration of \$57 million per year in Virginia Public School Authority educational technology equipment grants more than offsets these reductions in the first year of the biennium.

Our recommended reductions primarily reflect technical issues and a few of the suggestions we heard from the Governor. What we did <u>not</u> do is back track on the programs and standards that are vital to our educational progress.

In addition, the state retirement system savings you have heard about -- that helped us accomplish this feat without any contribution from the car tax -- will also generate local retirement savings that can help locals maintain school funding.

Despite this herculean effort to minimize additional reductions, we remained mindful that the budget as introduced included \$393 million in GF reductions over the biennium, plus there is \$754 million in state funding now missing from biennial school budgets for support positions due to last session's action. We cannot pretend that these reductions will not impact classroom instruction in Virginia. As a result, we've all had "responsible flexibility" at the front of our minds throughout the Session:

- The Senate passed legislation delaying implementation of new standards of accreditation -- with the important exception of the graduation and completion rate index -- until July 1, 2011.
- The Subcommittee took this relief a step further, asking DOE to recommend the elimination of any testing that is not absolutely necessary.
- Based on all the testimony we heard that class sizes will increase, we would allow some <u>temporary</u> flexibility on class size maximums if necessary.
- Building on the work of the Joint Subcommittee on Education Funding, the Senate also passed a bill relieving school divisions of the costly burden of collecting the triennial census of school-aged population.
- From our Fall retreat and testimony this Session, we know there are successful consolidated services arrangements around the State that could serve as models for other areas, so we've asked JLARC to include schools and local governments in its planned study of regional cooperation this year.

In my opening comments, I mentioned the Composite Index conundrum we faced. The Subcommittee -- and I think probably the entire Senate -- discussed and debated how to handle the "LCI". The introduced budget "froze" it in FY 2011, much to the consternation of those Northern Virginia localities due to "finally" receive a greater share of state funding for education due to the housing downturn. On the other hand, as soon as Governor McDonnell proposed unfreezing it -- with NO "hold harmless" component -- we heard the cries from Hampton Roads and other areas of the state, especially given the other proposed education reductions.

In the end we went with a pragmatic approach. To alleviate some of the unprecedented stress on local budgeting, we recommend 1) unfreezing the LCI in FY 2011 <u>AND</u> 2) providing a full hold harmless for all school divisions in both years of the biennium. However, the MOST important thing we have done to protect pupil equity is our great effort to minimize overall reductions as much as possible.

Public Education is THE best long term investment we can make to improve the lives of Virginians – collectively and individually. In spite of the economic and budgetary realities this year, we put forward these budget recommendations as a workable plan to preserve the quality educational system that will form the basis of our recovery and jobs of tomorrow.

#### **Higher Education**

Higher education is an area that has already sustained large reductions from actions that have been necessary since FY 2008. In fact, over one-quarter of our higher education funding has been eliminated while the system has sustained significant enrollment growth. For that reason, the Subcommittee is recommending <u>no</u> additional reductions to our public colleges and universities above what is contained in the introduced budget. It is our hope that this will help save additional jobs in this area. And, allow our institutions of higher education to continue producing students that become valuable members of our workforce. We

also want to preserve our institutions ability to improve that workforce by providing additional training and job skills.

After hearing from our higher education institutions and from students, the highest priority of the Subcommittee for higher education was restoring the proposed five percent transfer from auxiliary balances. The Subcommittee agreed that this action would set a troubling precedent and therefore recommends the restoration of these funds, \$18.8 million in FY 2011.

Next, the Subcommittee carefully considered the Governor's recommendations for additional reductions. For that reason, the Subcommittee did endorse a reduction to the tuition assistance program of almost \$10 million.

The Subcommittee also adopted an in-state student capital outlay fee at \$2.50 per credit hour to be dedicated to the debt service of future projects that have already been authorized.

As I have stated in years past, we acknowledge that our institutions of higher education will certainly have to raise tuition as they experience large reductions to their general fund support, and now as the federal stimulus money that we used to backfill some of these reductions runs out, it is expected. But again, we feel confident that our public colleges and universities will make prudent decisions that continue to promote access to higher education for Virginia residents while mitigating tuition increases to the degree that is possible. Therefore, we have found it again unnecessary to artificially limit the flexibility of our institutions of higher education to set their own tuition rates. And, the institutions and our students should know that this Subcommittee will work diligently in the future to restore the funding that has been lost during these tough economic times.

In conclusion, protecting education funding and mitigating the negative impacts felt by our students, educators, and localities were key objectives. The Subcommittee's recommendations will save jobs and services by minimizing reductions, and we have provided flexibility in areas where we thought it would be beneficial, but not harmful.

The education of our citizenry is critical to our future. Although the economy is difficult at this moment, I know that Virginia has a bright future because we will continue to work together to improve the lives of all Virginians. We look forward with confidence that we will persevere, and that in time we will be able to reinvest in our future.

For details on these and other recommendations of the Subcommittee, summary tables and selected language amendments are attached. We offer them to the Committee for its consideration.

Student support positions which include: Social work administrative positions; Guidance administrative positions not included in the SOQ; Homebound administrative positions supporting instruction; Attendance support positions related to truancy and drop-out prevention; Health and behavioral positions, including school nurses and school psychologists;
- 4. Instructional personnel support, including professional development positions and library and media positions not included in the SOQ.
- 5. Technology professional positions not included in the SOQ.
- 6. Operational and maintenance positions, including facilities, pupil transportation positions; operation, and maintenance professional and service positions: security services, trades and laborer positions.
- 7. Technical and clerical positions, including fiscal and human resource technical/clerical, student support technical/clerical, instructional personnel support technical/clerical, operation and maintenance technical/clerical, administrative technical/clerical, and technology technical/clerical positions.
- 8. School based clerical personnel in elementary schools, part-time to 299 students, one full-time at 300 students: clerical personnel in middle school, one full-time for and one additional full time for each 600 students beyond 200 students and one full-time for the library at 750 students: clerical personnel in high schools, one full-time and one additional full-time for each 600 students beyond 200 students and one full-time for the library at 750 students.

School divisions may use the state and local funds for support services to provide additional instructional services.

The Department of Education shall make its calculation for the total cost of rebenchmarking for the fiscal year 2012-2014 biennium to be consistent with the following methodologies: (i) using the 'support position funding cap' methodology change contained in Chapter 781, 2009 Acts of Assembly; and (ii) using the rebenchmarking methodology which was contained within Chapter 879, from the 2008 Session. The Department of Education shall report the final calculations and related costs derived from each of these methodologies to the Governor, the Chairmen of House Appropriations and Senate Finance Committees, and the Board of Education prior to September 1, 2011."

services" and permits school divisions to use funds for support services to provide additional instructional services, as recommended by the Board of Education in its October 30, 2009 Review of the Standards of Quality. - "g. 1) An education technology grant program shall be conducted through the Virginia Public School Authority, through the issuance of equipment notes in an amount estimated at \$57,610,000 in fiscal year 2011 and \$57,792,000 in fiscal year 2012. Proceeds of the notes will be used to establish a computer-based instructional and testing system for the Standards of Learning (SOL) and to develop the capability for high speed Internet connectivity at high schools followed by middle schools followed by elementary schools. By fiscal year 2011, high schools within the division shall administer 100 percent of SOL tests online; by fiscal year 2012, middle and high schools shall administer 100 percent of SOL tests online; and by fiscal year 2013, elementary, middle, and high schools shall administer 100 percent of SOL tests online. School divisions shall use these funds first to develop and maintain the capability to support the administration of online SOL testing for all students with the exception of students with a documented need for a paper SOL test.
- 2) The Board of Education shall authorize amounts estimated at \$10,704,564 the second year from the Literary Fund to provide debt service payments for the education technology grant program conducted through the Virginia Public School Authority in fiscal year 2011.
- 3) It is the intent of the General Assembly to authorize sufficient Literary Fund revenues to pay debt service on the Virginia Public School Authority bonds or notes authorized for education technology grant programs in fiscal year 2011 and in fiscal year 2012. In developing the proposed 2012-14, 2014-2016, and 2016-2018 biennial

budgets for public education, the Board of Education shall include a recommendation to the Governor to authorize sufficient Literary Fund revenues to make debt service payments for these programs in fiscal years 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, and 2018.

- 4) Grant funds from the issuance of \$57,610,000 in fiscal year 2011 and \$57,792,000 in fiscal year 2012 in equipment notes are based on a grant of \$26,000 per school and \$50,000 per school division. For purposes of this grant program, eligible schools shall include schools that are subject to state accreditation and reporting membership in grades K through 12 as of September 30, 2010, for the fiscal year 2011 issuance, and September 30, 2011, for the fiscal year 2012 issuance, as well as regional vocational centers, special education centers, alternative education centers, regular school year Governor's Schools, and the School for the Deaf and the Blind. Schools that serve only pre-kindergarten students shall not be eligible for this grant.
- 5) Supplemental grants shall be allocated to eligible divisions to support schools that are not fully accredited in accordance with this paragraph. Schools that administer SOL tests in Spring 2010 and that are not fully accredited based on school accreditation ratings in effect for fiscal year 2011 will qualify for a supplemental grant of \$26,000 per school in fiscal years 2011, 2012, and 2013. Schools that administer SOL tests in Spring 2011 and that are not fully accredited based on school accreditation ratings in effect for fiscal year 2012 will qualify for a supplemental grant of \$26,000 per school in fiscal years 2012, 2013, and 2014. Schools eligible to receive these three-year supplemental grants shall only receive them one time.

#### 6) Required local match:

- a) Localities are required to provide a match for these funds equal to 20 percent of the grant amount, including the supplemental grants provided pursuant to paragraph g. 5). At least 25 percent of the local match shall be used for teacher training in the use of instructional technology. The Superintendent of Public Instruction is authorized to reduce the required local match for school divisions with a composite index of local ability-to-pay below 0.2000. The School for the Deaf and the Blind is exempt from the match requirement.
- b) School divisions that administer 100 percent of SOL tests online in all elementary, middle, and high schools may use up to 75 percent of their required local match to purchase targeted technology-based interventions. Such interventions may include the necessary technology and software to support online learning, technology-based content systems, content management systems, technology equipment systems,

information and data management systems, and other appropriate technologies that support the individual needs of learners. School divisions that receive supplemental grants of \$26,000 per school pursuant to paragraph g. 5) and where 100 percent of SOL tests are administered online in the schools receiving the supplemental grants shall give first priority to purchasing these technology-based interventions as well as teacher training in the use of the interventions from their required local match.

- 7) The goal of the education technology grant program is to improve the instructional, remedial, and testing capabilities of the Standards of Learning for local school divisions and to increase the number of schools achieving full accreditation.
- 8) Funds shall be used in the following manner:
- a) Each division shall use funds to reach a goal, in each high school, of: (1) a 5-to-1 student to computer ratio; (2) an Internet-ready local area network (LAN) capability; and (3) high speed access to the Internet. School connectivity (computers, LANs and network access) shall include sufficient download/upload capability to ensure that each student will have adequate access to Internet-based instructional, remedial and assessment programs.
- b) When each high school in a division meets the goals established in paragraph a) above, the remaining funds shall be used to develop similar capability in first the middle schools and then the elementary schools.
- c) School divisions shall be eligible to apply for and receive supplemental grants of \$26,000 per qualifying school pursuant to paragraph g. 5). These supplemental grants shall be used first for the purpose of developing and maintaining capacity to support 100 percent online SOL testing of all students in qualifying schools and helping the schools achieve full accreditation with the assistance of targeted technology-based interventions. Any purchase of technology-based interventions as described in paragraph g. 6) b) with supplemental grant funds must be qualifying expenses under the technology notes program. Eligibility for these funds requires divisions to submit an application and plan that includes goals, objectives, strategies, and a timeline for implementation. Division plans will be reviewed and approved by the Superintendent of Public Instruction prior to disbursement of the supplemental grant funds.
- d) Pursuant to § 15.2-1302, Code of Virginia, and in the event that two or more school divisions became one school division, whether by consolidation of only the

school divisions or by consolidation of the local governments, such resulting division shall be provided funding through this program on the basis of having the same number of school divisions as existed prior to September 30, 2000.

9) Local school divisions shall maximize the use of available federal funds, including E-Rate Funds, and to the extent possible, use such funds to supplement the program and meet the goals of this program.".

#### **Explanation:**

(This amendment adds \$10.7 million the second year for debt service on the FY 2011 educational technology equipment notes to reinstate the issuance of an estimated \$57.6 million in FY 2011 and \$57.8 million in FY 2012 based on a grant of \$26,000 per school and \$50,000 per school division. For purposes of this grant program, eligible schools include those that are subject to state accreditation and reporting membership in grades K through 12. Supplemental grants will be allocated to eligible divisions to support schools that are not fully accredited.)
