2022 Report of the Economic Development and Natural Resources Subcommittee The Honorable David W. Marsden, Chair February 20, 2022

Madam Chair and Members of the Committee:

Your Subcommittee has carefully reviewed the Governor's introduced budget for the Secretariats of Agriculture & Forestry, Commerce & Trade, Labor, and Natural Resources. We have thoughtfully considered those proposals, along with those offered by our Senate colleagues.

As Virginia's robust economy continues to experience remarkable growth coming out of the pandemic, we must apply the lessons learned from COVID while positioning the Commonwealth for future economic success. To this end, the Subcommittee recommends more than \$500.0 million in new investments in Commerce & Trade above the budget we adopted one year ago.

Growing all sectors of Virginia's economy, across all regions of the Commonwealth, is a key priority of the Subcommittee. As such, the Subcommittee endorses a strategic investment of \$150.0 million in the development of business-ready sites. Allocation of this funding will benefit every corner of the Commonwealth and strengthen Virginia's ability to recruit new businesses that are looking to make capital investments in new facilities, in the immediate future.

Keeping existing commitments to our business partners is another key priority of the Subcommittee. In this respect, the Subcommittee recommends providing more than \$100.0 million to meet our commitments to Amazon HQ2 and other MEI-approved projects.

One hard-learned lesson of the pandemic is that the health of our economy, and our society, depends upon growing innovative industries

from the research being undertaken at our institutions of higher education, particularly in the areas of biosciences, pharmaceutical manufacturing, and data analytics. To enhance our ability to compete for private, philanthropic, and federal research funding in these critical areas, the Subcommittee recommends a generational investment of more than \$100.0 million in transformational projects across the Commonwealth.

Additionally, statewide access to broadband and quality, affordable housing are concerns for many Virginians that the pandemic only intensified. Our recommendations include a record total investment of \$300.0 million over the biennium for the Housing Trust Fund. The budget we recommend also includes almost \$100.0 million over the for broadband infrastructure through the Telecommunication Initiative. These and other recommended investments in community and economic development reflect the Subcommittee's determination to support our citizens, and our employers, as we navigate our way out of the challenges of the pandemic.

Another hard-learned lesson from the pandemic that must be addressed is the performance of the Virginia Employment Commission, and the impact that years of under-investment have had on the individuals and businesses that rely on the VEC. To this end, the Subcommittee recommends an additional deposit of \$110.0 million in federal American Rescue Plan Act funds to the Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund to prevent the unemployment tax rate on all Virginia businesses from increasing, as well as a series of JLARC recommended amendments to address claims adjudication, citizen appeals and IT challenges at VEC.

Your Subcommittee strongly embraces our shared commitment to environmental stewardship and recommends providing almost \$515.0 million for new investments in the areas of Natural & Historic Resources and Agriculture & Forestry. Of this new spending, a record \$313.0 million deposit to the Water Quality Improvement Fund will provide more than \$230.0 million in support of continued investments in cost-effective agricultural best management practices that improve the long-term health of our beloved Chesapeake Bay. Additionally, these

funds support remediation efforts for Harmful Algal Blooms occurring in both the Shenandoah River and Lake Anna.

The Subcommittee believes in strengthening our commitment to land conservation programs and recommends more than \$40.0 million be deposited in FY 2023 to Virginia's three flagship land conservation funds. As you know, the pandemic also intensified the demand being placed on Virginia State Parks, and the Subcommittee recommends approximately \$20.0 million in new operating support for our world-class State Park system.

Focusing on our changing climate, we recommend a total of \$30.0 million be invested to reduce Virginia's reliance on carbon-based power sources, and to begin addressing the real-world impacts of climate change that Virginians are experiencing today. Specifically, the Subcommittee recommends \$10.0 million to capitalize a new fund to provide for the distribution of electric vehicle charging stations across economically distressed regions of the Commonwealth. Additionally, the Subcommittee recommends \$10.0 million for incentives to homeowners that elect to install solar power, and \$10.0 million to capitalize the Resilient Virginia Revolving Fund with an eye towards beginning the long process of remediation efforts in flood-prone regions of the Commonwealth.

This completes the report of the Economic Development and Natural Resources Subcommittee. I hope it will be the pleasure of the Committee to adopt our amendments.

"F.1 The Secretary of Labor shall prioritize improvements and modernization of the Virginia Employment Commission (VEC) as outlined in the November 2021 JLARC Report, "Operations and Performance of the Virginia Employment Commission," including an analysis of the report's 40 recommendations and 10 policy options. Emphasis shall be placed on improving customer service and interactions with the public in the immediate time frame while still dealing with pandemic-related issues and long-range plans to improve the transparency of processes and services. Additional focus shall be placed on (i) overall funding and management of the Unemployment Insurance (UI) trust; (ii) reviewing benefit levels for income replacement; (iii) ensuring appropriate staffing levels and well-trained personnel; and (iv) addressing technology needs. The current backlog of 2020 and 2021 claims shall be expedited for resolution immediately, including but not limited to resolving any outstanding claims; accounting for overpayments or inappropriate payments; and improving processes to prevent fraud and better identify valid claims.

2. The Secretary of Labor shall competitively procure a national firm with expertise in evaluating the efficiency of an organization's staffing structure, delegation of staff duties, and work processes to conduct a comprehensive efficiency review of the UI operations of the Virginia Employment Commission to (i) identify specific actions that could be taken to improve the efficiency of VEC's UI operations, including through more efficient and effective use of staff and technology; (ii) recommend improvements to the agency's staffing and workflows to most effectively use existing federal funding for UI operations; and (iii) determine whether current funding is adequate to ensure effective UI operations. The Secretary shall issue an interim report of its findings and recommendations to the General Assembly no later than December 1, 2022, and a final report no later than September 1, 2023."
